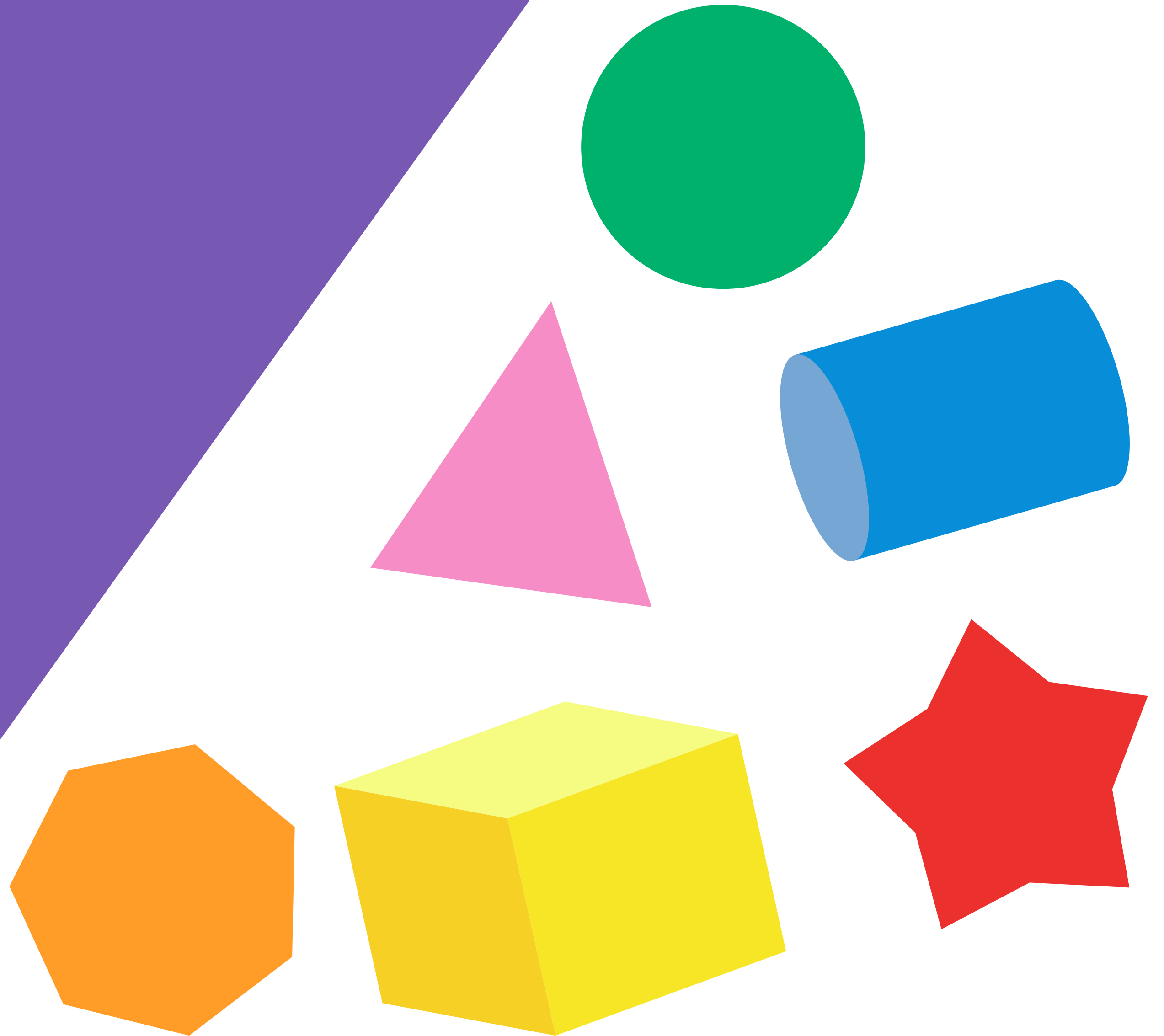
Let's discuss what rubbish we used, and how we made our creations.
