

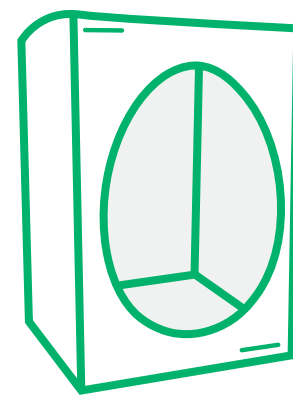
Learn all you need to know about **recycling** correctly this Easter! Be a good egg and follow Repak's **easy** step by step **C.D.L** (clean, dry, loose) manual.

Repak will guide you on what packaging can go in your recycling bin this Easter.

Irish residents are expected to recycle over 58,000 tonnes this Easter, enough to fill Dublin's Aviva Stadium over 3.5 times! Ireland is currently recycling 31% of plastics, but that needs to increase to 50% by the end of 2025 and 55% by 2030.

All plastics can now go into the recycling bin, giving us a chance to increase Ireland's plastic recycling rates.

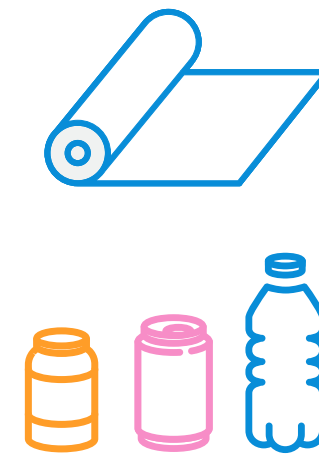
## 1. CHOCOLATE EASTER EGG PACKAGING



**Eaten all the Easter eggs? Here's how to recycle the packaging**

- Separate the packaging – this includes the cardboard box and rigid plastic insert that holds the egg
- Fold cardboard boxes flat
- Scrunch the clean tinfoil/colourful foil into a ball
- Place all packaging into the recycling bin – clean, dry and loose

## 2. ALUMINUM FOIL AND FOOD WRAPPINGS



**Planning a BBQ or family dinner this Easter?**

- All plastics can go into the recycling bin! This includes bread wrappers, vegetable and salad wraps and bags, outer wrap of cheese packs, frozen food bags, as well as plastic pots, tubs and trays
- Make sure all packaging is free from food waste, dry and place in the recycling bin loosely

## 3. EGG BOXES / CRAFT MATERIALS



**Getting crafty this Easter?**

- Remember to reuse egg boxes for your crafts and once done, place them into the recycling bin clean and dry
- Items such as ribbons should be reused for crafts or re-gifted, if not please place in the general waste bin

## 4. EASTER GIFT CARDS AND ENVELOPES



**Expecting to be gifted lovely Easter cards?**

- Envelopes and cards can also go into the recycling bin, but remember to place in loosely

## 5. CHOCOLATE / BISCUIT PLASTIC TRAYS & TINS



**Enjoying some lovely Easter chocolate or biscuits?**

- Once your delicious treats are gone, place the rigid plastic tray or biscuit tin in the recycling bin
- Remember clean, dry and loose!
